We've Come a Long Way Baby!!

Just 5 short years ago, the Dayton Community Development Association (DCDA) was born. This is a group of very dedicated volunteers, who's goal it is to make Dayton an even more amazing place to live, work, shop, visit and play.



One of our first projects, in collaboration with the City of Dayton, was to help building owners improve their facades. Grant funds of about \$13,000 were leveraged into over \$150,000 in building façade improvements! More are on the way!



The DCDA is part of the Oregon Main Street Program. We are using the National Main Street Four Point Approach ™ as our model for revitalization of our downtown. The Main Street Approach is a proven comprehensive approach to commercial historic district revitalization. This approach has been implemented in more than 2200 cities and towns in 40 states across the nation.

Why is a healthy and vibrant downtown important?

1. Downtown is a symbol of community economic health, local quality of life, pride and community history.

 A vital downtown retains and creates jobs, which means a stronger tax base.
Downtown is a good incubator for new small businesses. These are the building blocks of a healthy economy.

4. A healthy downtown core protects property values in the community.

5. The traditional commercial district is an ideal location for independent businesses. This keeps profits and jobs in town, with local families.

6. Best of all, a revitalized downtown provides an important civic forum where members of the community can congregate and visitors can enjoy feeling a part of our community.

How the Park Got Its Name



The park in the middle of our downtown is a favorite gathering place for those who live here and for visitors to our small town. We come here to play and picnic; to spend time with family and friends. The City has beautified the park through the years; adding a bandstand, picnic shelter

and play equipment; and is now finishing up the fountain restoration.

But, did you know that the park's official name is Courthouse Square Park? What?! Where's the courthouse?

Back in 1850, Joel Palmer, one of the town's founders, set aside this plot of land for a County Courthouse. He and other prominent citizens pledged money and property toward its construction. After several years of politicking and intrigue, Dayton lost this bid to be the County seat of government.

Ever since then, this block has been used as a public park. And that is why it's official name is Courthouse Square Park!

Martin Miller Fountain

The Martin Miller Fountain in Courthouse Square Park is under construction. The fountain is being rebuilt to honor the original Miller Fountain, but it will include a few subtle alterations. The



major difference is that the new fountain will include moving water, with flows to and from the center column. In addition to the fountain rebuild, the interior pathways in the park are also being improved. There will be an 8' sidewalk from Ferry Street to the fountain and from the fountain to the bandstand. There will be new decorative details to both structures as well that will make our park look even better. The construction will be done by May 22nd, which is the date of our first Friday Night event.



Former Fisher Farms Property



Almost a year ago, the City purchased an agricultural property most recently known as Fisher Farms. The City's purpose in acquiring the land was to utilize the existing water rights and wells. The property is about 60 acres in total, and while the City will hold up to 10 acres of this

space for eventual operation of the wells and other Public Works needs, the remaining acreage will be leased for other uses. About 45 acres is being dry-farmed by Bernards Bros. The appearance and condition of the property has already greatly improved and their initial crop is planted. A few months ago the City also entered into a Land Option Agreement with the ERORA Group out of Louisville, Kentucky. This lease will allow them to use about 6 acres, on a separate parcel, to develop a solar farm. The purpose of the Land Option Agreement is to give them time to design the solar farm and execute a Power Sales Agreement with PGE before exercising their option on the subject parcel. If, for whatever reason, they do not execute their option on the land, the City will look for other ways to utilize the property.

Tree Giveaway

In January residents were able to get a good look at the newly purchased Fisher Farms property during the Community Tree Giveaway. We welcomed dozens of families who were able to select and remove whatever trees and shrubs they wanted. The



morning drizzle was initially a concern but the moisture ended up being an aid in the tree digging by softening the soil. There were trucks, tractors, and most commonly, shovels, being worked by the hands of our residents as they removed their selections in the rain. There were individuals, couples, and families, some even multi-generational, working together to take home a tree. The reaction was extremely positive and more than 100 trees left the farm and will hopefully be used to improve Dayton properties. Despite the muddy, wet, and chilly environment, the event was definitely a success and we were very glad so much of the stock was saved.

Mayoral Beautification Awards will be given out this summer, May through August, for those homes and yards bringing pride to their owners, neighborhoods and community. (Yards must be code compliant) Prizes will be awarded in the form of gift certificates to our local businesses.
